


June 19

WHAT IS IT? Juneteenth (short for "June Nineteenth") marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed. The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth honors the end of slavery in the United States and is considered the longest-running African American holiday.

JUNETEENTH CHRONOLOGY









1353 January 1

The Emancipation
Proclamation, issued by
President Lincoln, went into
effect; however it could not be
implemented in places still
under Confederate control.

/365 June 19

2,000 Union troops arrived in Galveston, Texas. The army announced that more than 250,000 enslaved Black people in the state were free by executive decree.

1365 December 6

The 13th Amendment of the Constitution was ratified, officially abolishing slavery in the United States.

/355 June 1

Formerly enslaved people in Galveston celebrated a year of freedom with the "Juneteenth" holiday. Juneteenth celebrations quickly spread to the rest of the country, and continue to be the oldest known tradition honoring the end of slavery in the U.S.

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If the cruelties of slavery could not stop us, the opposition we now face will surely fail.
